What is the funding?

The Literacy and Numeracy Catch-Up Premium provides schools with an additional funding for each Year 7 student who did not achieve the expected standard (Level 4) in reading and/or Maths at the end of Key Stage 2.

What is the allocation for Y7 Literacy and Numeracy Catch up premium for 2020-21?

The total funding is £7500 which equates to 18 students (£470 per student) who were below the expected standard in reading and/or Maths at the end of Key Stage 2 in the Summer term 2019.

What was the allocation for Y7 Literacy and Numeracy Catch up premium for 2019-20?

The total funding was £7500 which equates to approximately 16 students (£470 per student) who were below the expected standard in reading and/or Maths at the end of Key Stage 2.

How was the Y7 Catch up premium spent last year?

The catch up premium was allocated in the following ways:

- The employment of HLTA to work with students on a 1:1 basis in numeracy, literacy and handwriting skills.
- The use of specialist programmes (IDL- International Dyslexia Learning and International Dyscalculia Learning, Access Reading Testing, SNIP spelling package)
- The employment of a wellbeing mentor to have dedicated time for Year 7 students from the catch up group who needed additional SEMH support.

What was the impact?

In Reading, 16 students had achieved below the expected level at the end of Key stage 2. By the end of Year 7, 14 students had improved their English level and made at least expected progress; 5 of whom had made beyond expected progress.

The final remaining students are working steadily towards the expected standard and will be included in Year 8 small group intervention 2020-21.

In Maths, 9 students had achieved below the expected level at the end of primary school. At the end of Year 7, 11 of these students had improved their Maths level and made at least expected progress; with 2 students making beyond expected progress. The remaining 4 students are working towards the expected standard and making steady progress as part of a further small group support programme.

Intervention activities and specialist programmes will continue to support the the students during academic Year 8 to ensure good progress is continued.
